Frequently Asked Questions:

Identify and elaborate on the historical significance of the following. Remember you are NOT merely writing the definition, but are detailing the meaning and importance of the term. Hand write your response, followed by the page number and paragraph number from which you located the information.

If I did not provide enough spacing for your response, feel free to write on notebook paper. Specify the significances you answer, however.

The following is an example of a significance for chapter three:

*“Hellenistic era: a time in world history when Greek leader, Alexander, spread Greek culture and ways of life across Eurasia. This period began in 323 B.C.E. and concluded roughly in 30 B.C.E. Greek culture and knowledge, through conquest, diffused to Egypt, Mesopotamia, and India. Before fading, this period marked a cultural encounter, originating with the competition between the Greco-Persian Wars.
(pgs. 115 to 117)”*

Notice that, in this example, I cited multiple pages. This is justifiable if you use the cited pages to complete your answer. Hypothetically, if one uses the third paragraph of page 116 to answer the significance, the following is a proper citation: (pg. 116, paragraph 3).
